School Uniform





The children have returned to school looking very smart in their new school uniform and I thank you for ensuring the children look their very best when representing the school.

A few reminders:

- School shoes and not trainers should be worn (unless a PE day).
- PE uniform consists of a plain white or white with the Holy Cross logo t-shirt and black shorts or jogging bottoms. Football strips or brightly coloured tops or leggings are not to be worn.
- For health and safety reasons, no jewellery should be worn, other than a watch and one pair of stud earrings. *No necklaces* including scapulars are to be worn.
- Hair must not be highly stylised; long hair should be tied up; and no artificial colour should be in the hair. Some children have returned from the summer break with coloured weaves and/or dye in their hair or tram lines cut into the hair. Please refer to our uniform policy which states:

Hair must always be neat and clean. Exceedingly long or short hair or hair which is artificially highly coloured or stylised will be commented upon and a change requested. For boys: hair should be no longer than meets the top of the collar and no shorter than a No 2 haircut in a standard style. For girls: long hair should be tied back e.g. pony tail, plaits. Hair decorations are not permitted.

• Please do label all of your child's belonging so that lost property can be reunited with the rightful owner.

Parents' Evenings

Parents' Evenings will take place on Tues 7th and Thurs 9th November. This is an important opportunity for you to see how your child has settled into their new class, meet their new teacher if you haven't already done so, and to see what your child is learning so that you can support them at home. Once the time slots have been opened, a PING will be sent. We look forward to seeing you all on these evenings and sharing some of the fantastic learning your children have done in class.

Swimming - Year 5

We are pleased to be able offer swimming lessons to our Year 5 Alder class children from Wednesday 27th September. Please ensure your child brings a swimming costume or trunks, a towel and a swimming hat for girls with long hair. Also, it is easier for girls to wear socks rather than tights on the days they swim as it is quicker when changing. Payment for swimming is made via ParentPay and children should participate in every lesson. A note from parents will be needed if a child is unable to swim on a particular week.

Clubs



Definition of cultural capital:

 The values, knowledge or ideas that parents can pass on to their children, which can then influence their success at school and later in life.

Cultural Capital

In school, we work so hard to give the children as many first-hand experiences as we can; however, we would love for the children to experience more. The term 'cultural capital' refers to the real-life experiences children have with their families, and these experiences have been proven time and again to have a https://example.com/huge-impact-on-a-child'slearning. Let me give you an example: if a child has gone on an autumn walk and picked conkers, acorns and sycamore seeds (helicopters); seen the leaves change colour and fall; seen

that some leaves change colour but others do not; heard the rustle as they walk through them; felt the change in temperature and moisture in the air – they will be able to draw upon this when they are reading or writing about autumn or the changes in seasons. Whilst you might say that this could be learnt from a book or online, the chance to experience it first-hand allows the children to see, touch, smell, and hear the effects of autumn and this is what cultural capital is all about. During the recent TD Day, we discussed ways in which we could promote and highlight such opportunities for our families, and staff came up with the idea of including some useful places to visit within the newsletter. I thought this was an excellent idea and so here are the first few ideas:



Coate Water Country Park

As headteacher, I have a 'challenge' that runs alongside a theme for each of my assemblies. Earlier in the year, the theme was the wildlife that I had photographed whilst at Coate Water. During a visit, I wonder if your child could show you the following: a heron, a cormorant, a young swan, a black swan (yes, there is one there!), a squirrel and a robin. You could make up an 'eye spy' list to see how many they can cross off. The conkers are out now and children always have great

fun finding these and running through the leaves as they look for them. Could they use the internet or a book to find out what a conker is and why the leaves fall from the trees? https://www.swindon.gov.uk/info/20077/parks and open spaces/487/coate water park

Oh, I do like to be beside the seaside...

The current theme for my assembly is the seaside and we have learnt all about the following: promenades

(prom); buckets, spades and sandcastles; rock pools; animals you might find at the seaside including jellyfish, seagulls, seals, crabs; and food you often find there — including sticks of rock, candy floss etc. Many of our children have never visited the beach and this would be a wonderful opportunity to help your child appreciate all that we are learning about during our Friday assemblies — I'm sure they will even sing you the song, if you ask them The closest beaches to Swindon are



Weston-Super-Mare and Bournemouth – autumn is a lovely time to visit a beach, so why don't you see if you could do a day trip during the October half term?

Chedworth Roman Villa



Chedworth Roman Villa is a fantastic place to visit to find out all about the Romans. If your child is in Year 4, this is their topic this term and I know they would really enjoy a visit. There are so many hands-on things for children to do and they have special theme days during the October half term. Chedworth is owned by the National Trust and so there is an entry charge

I look forward to hearing from the children all about the exciting places they have been and how much they have learnt.



Seeing Holy Cross upgraded to a GOOD rating across all measures is a fantastic result and recognises the hard work and dedication of all the staff and the leadership at Holy Cross who have worked tirelessly to improve our school for the good of our all our pupils. As a board we would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all the staff and pupils here at Holy Cross for the part they all played in this achievement.

The Governing Board now looks forward to the year ahead during which we will be focussing on a range of issues which affect the school. It is great to see the fruits of our efforts from last year to make improvements to the school grounds with the extension to the playground and the removal of the mound in the playing field, I hope you all agree that this is a huge improvement. Our thanks go out to the school Site Manager for all his work in making this possible as the additional space and will allow the school to make better use of the grounds for the benefit of our pupils.

Over the summer holiday, governors have held discussions with the Borough Council on the issue of road safety around our school, this is a safeguarding issue and something that we all take very seriously. As a result of these discussions, a new sign on Queens Drive has been installed to advise people that the pavement up to the school is not a cycle lane and we like to would remind everyone that cycling on the pavement and parking in the layby outside of the school is prohibited, not following these simple rules puts pupils, parents and carers at unnecessary risk. Parking arrangements are in place for parents to use the County Ground car park free of charge at drop off and pick up times and we urge you all to use this for the wellbeing of everyone. We will be continuing these discussions to identify other possible ways we may be able to improve road safety and we will continue to encourage both the Borough Council and the Police to enforce these rules and to issue fixed penalties where appropriate.

We would like to offer all the pupils and staff at Holy Cross our best wishes for the year ahead.



Year 5 parents should join the main congregation.


There will be a second collection at the end of Mass and all monies collected with be donated to the Clifton Diocese Water Pump Project.
